Pinus nigra

Austrian Pine'

As the common name suggests, the Austrian Pine is not a native species to North America. It has its roots in Southeastern Europe and on the slopes of the Alps. It was introduced to our shores in the mid 18th century primarily for ornamental and timber purposes. Its typically straight trunk and fast growth made it quite useful in furniture and construction activities. Its pyramidical shape when young, growing to large flat topped tree when mature made it an attractive choice in the landscape and a useful tree as a windbreak.

Although marginally naturalized, Austrian pines in the Maritimes will largely be found where they have been planted by humans in urban settings. It is well adapted to urban pollutions and salt spray, but does tend to be more susceptible to disease, fungal and insect issues than other pine species. The number of insect pests that attack Pinus nigra make it a favourite haunt for Yellow Bellied sap suckers, who can cause significant damage to the tree on their own. A bird to watch for!

Under perfect conditions the tree can grow to 100 feet and live 200 years. The wonderful example of this species on the East side of the Public Gardens near the Grand Allee may not be that old but it is a lovely large specimen nonetheless.
